STATE FAIR HONEY COMPETITION CHANGES FOR 2005

At the October 17th SEMBA Annual Meeting, there was considerable discussion about the honey-beeswax competition at the 2004 State Fair.

Increasing the number of people who enter and a fairer allocation of prize money were a few of the issues debated.

Bill SIRR volunteered to contact the State Fair officials to see if we can change the system for competing with honey products to allow for multiple entries in the same categories. On November 8, 2004 Dan and Joyce Guthrie, Dick Miller and Roger Sutherland met with Rod Jordan, head of the Michigan State Fair Agriculture Section and Marian Thuma, secretary. (Bill SIRR was unable to attend because of an unexpected commitment.)

At the onset of the meeting, we were informed that SEMBA would not be able to enter honey products as a group as we have done in the past. Auditors for MDA say that entries can only be by individuals and not by a group. Each individual must complete an entry form and pay a \$10 entry fee. With this registration, the individual can enter any number of honey-beeswax categories as well as other items listed in the Agriculture Section of the fair book.

SEMBA will still be able to have a booth for beekeeping education maintained by members as in the past. SEMBA will buy the parking pass for our members to use.

One of the concerns expressed by SEMBA was the need for additional display space. Mr. Jordan assured us that additional space would be provided.

Mr. Jordan asked us to review the twelve categories listed in the honey-beeswax competition and to suggest changes in prize money, number of items or poundage required for each category, new categories to include such as educational displays by individuals, and a producer display for best-of-show.

The SEMBA committee will be meeting soon to discuss these possible changes, so if you have any suggestions please notify, Dan/Joyce Guthrie, Ann Kerwin, Dick Miller, Bill SIRR, Roger Sutherland or Dyanne Tracy.

February 1, 2005 is the deadline for submission of changes to the Michigan Department of Agriculture State Fair people for inclusion in the 2005 Fair Book.

CLEANING BEESWAX CAPPINGS

First quality always brings the high dollar, and so it should. The extra effort is worth a little extra. So it is with beeswax. For the small operator, the solar

furnace is a must, even if only one hive is involved. A solar furnace is inexpensive and simple to make. I have found it to be an easy and inexpensive way to get that clean wax by melting the cappings in a nylon stocking or panty hose.

After the cappings have drained on their own, I put them into a nylon hose, place it in a tub of water for a quick rinse, and hang it up to dry. The dried cappings-filled stocking is placed in the solar furnace. The wash water is then fed back to the bees. Wax left to be robbed out sometimes isn't, and the bees get trapped inside the ball or mound of wax. I usually find them when I take the wax apart.

To fill the nylon stocking, I use a paper tube 3 inches in diameter. These tubes come inside some paper rolls and are about 3 feet long. I cut off six to nine inches of the paper tube and pull the hose up over it until the toe is reached. Then I fill the tube with wax giving it a little shake from time to time. This will cause the hose to pull free of the tube now full of beeswax. This process is repeated until I run out of beeswax or nylon hose. This leg of wax is placed (after rinsing and drying) into the solar furnace. On a good sunny day, the leg will be emptied of wax and will hold the debris. A short piece of plastic drainpipe is even better than the paper tube for filling the stocking.

If your wax is placed in the solar furnace full of honey, the honey will run out first and fill the bottom of your mold. It can be poured off and the wax washed and allowed to dry.

Beeswax has many uses other than foundation and candles. It is a fine lubricant for wood and will help loosen rusted bolts. Put a little on your iron for easier ironing.

SEMBA ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

October 17, 2004

President Ron Forfinski called the meeting to order at 2:50 p.m. after the potluck meal. All present stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance. A total of 34 members signed in.

Ann Kerwin read the minutes of the February 8, 2004 winter meeting. It was Moved & Seconded to approve. Approved as read. Mary Sutherland read the treasurer's report. Moved & seconded to approve. Approved.

Keith Lazar read the list of State Fair winners: Display of bees & queens (Observation hive) – Tom Jenkins; Dick Miller – back-up hive; Amber extracted honey – Dan Guthrie; Round section comb honey – Dan Guthrie; White extracted honey – Kynis Maynor; Beeswax – Dyanne Tracy; Chunk honey – Judy Schmaltz; Cut comb honey – Dan Guthrie; Comb honey – Dan Guthrie; Overall exhibit (backboard) – Andrea Hoffman; Creamed honey – Dyanne Tracy; Deep Langstroth extracted comb – Earl Hoffman; Shallow Langstroth extracted comb – Ed Nowak.

The SEMBA Treasurer reports that as of December 1, 2004 the money for premiums has not been received from the State.

Bill SIRR said the State Fair is scheduled for the same time frame next year and that this early date is a problem for beekeepers as well as farmers. Bill will meet with MDA folks in Lansing to see if we can change the system for competing with honey products to allow for multiple entries in the same categories.

Nancy Schliebe spoke about the request of her organization, Seven Ponds Beekeepers' Club, to affiliate with SEMBA. The group meets at the Seven Ponds Nature Center in Dryden, Michigan, north of Oxford. It was Moved and Seconded to approve Chapter status for Seven Ponds. There was further discussion, then unanimous approval. It was Moved and Seconded that we change our constitution as follows: Article 3; Membership, section 2, will read: Oakland Beekeepers' Club, Schoolcraft Beekeepers' Club and Seven Ponds Beekeepers' Club shall be known as Chapters of SEMBA with all rights and privileges. Article 3. Section 3 will read: Oakland Beekeepers' Club, Schoolcraft Beekeepers' Club and Seven Ponds Beekeeper's Club retain their autonomous status for election of officers, scheduling meetings, programs and other activities. The changes were approved unanimously.

Ron Forfinski conducted election of officers. Ann Kerwin read the report of the Nominating Committee. The committee recommended for the post of 1st Vice-President – Keith Lazar; for Treasurer – Mary Sutherland; for Representative to the MBA – John Hernandez; and for Historian – Dick Miller. There were no further nominations and the entire recommended slate was elected.

Under unfinished business, Jerry Dunbar had some comments on the honey rules. It was pointed out that SEMBA is trying to get exemptions for beekeepers that harvest less than 700 lbs., and the guidelines for Michigan honey processors are evolving.

The November newsletter had an article about the Fremont Area Community Foundation which matches individual memorial gift donations \$1 for \$1 up to \$500 per donor household per year. It was Moved and Seconded that SEMBA would contribute \$500.00 in memory of David Barber to the Foundation earmarked for the Michigan Beekeepers' Association endowment fund. Approved. Individuals may also contribute.

Roger Sutherland thanked our Webmaster, Tom Lisk, for his work in putting 144 names on a list for e-mail notices. It means that the entire list will receive the notice, but each person receives one with only his or her name as addressee, not the whole list of members. Thank you, Tom.

There was a discussion of the need for a teacher for the beekeeping class because Earl Hoffman may not take it on next year. Keith Lazar will contact Earl and see where we stand. The question of spring bee

shipments is not clear at this time. Shaun Shubel of Sweet Nectar Apiaries may be making a trip to Georgia to transport bees. Shaun gave us an informative half hour summary of his operation in Howell. He also spoke of beekeepers working together, cooperatively. There have been suggestions that beekeepers create an alliance.

Meeting adjourned at 4:32 p.m.

THE 10 COMMANDMENTS OF BEEKEEPING

7. Thou shall provide adequate top entrance for good moisture control lest the bees be overcome of the flood.
8. Thou shall check and feed thy bees in the severe winter that they may have the joy of working the first crocuses of the spring.
9. Thou shall register thy bees lest thou be cast in the inner darkness of the dungeon.
10. Thou shall prepare and be ready for any bee sting emergency lest the joy of beekeeping be marred with sadness.
