MICHIGAN STATE FAIR APIARY-SECTION 3 RULE CHANGES

Rod Jordan, Agriculture Division Director, has
announced two changes in the rules and
regulations for the Apiary Division. These
changes were approved by the SEMBA
membership at the October 21, 2007 annual
meeting. The changes are as follows:

- (1) Apiary – Section 3 will be limited to 1
entry per class, per individual and 2
entries per class per household.
- (2) Containers for class 8665 (Display of
four 1 pound jars of creamed granulated
honey) must be in G.C.I. style standard
honey, glass jars. (These containers are
manufactured by the Gamber Glass
Container Company.)

QUEEN REARING COURSE TO BE OFFERED—SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

Larry Connor, Ph.D., has proposed a Queen
Rearing Course to be offered in 6 sessions in
May and June, 2008. The SEMBA Executive
Board has approved the course and authorized
an expenditure of \$600 for twenty \$30
scholarships for SEMBA members enrolled in
the course and who pay a \$150 tuition fee.
The course will be held at the Nowak Apiary in
Livonia. It will provide an intensive hands-on
training in queen rearing with the clear objective
of each student becoming competent in the
basics of raising queens and mating them in
mating nucs. Students must participate in all
sessions or provide a substitute if necessary.

Sunday, June 1..... 1 p.m. - 5 p.m.

Saturday, June 28..... 2 p.m. - 5 p.m.

The total registration fee is **\$180**. SEMBA

LARRY CONNOR'S COMMENT ON THE QUEEN REARING COURSE

So, why should you take the time to participate in the queen rearing and bee breeding course being offered this spring? As the instructor, I'll share my reasons for teaching such a class. First, it is rare to have an intensive course that is bee-cycle linked. We will spend 24 hrs together fit to the bees as their calendar dictates. We will follow the queen and drone cycles and (hopefully) see how they work while all the rest of the bee activities are underway. Second, when I learned queen rearing, I felt like I was working on an advanced degree in beekeeping. This is NOT an academic degree, but a field, lab-based experience that will expand your beekeeping skills more than you can possibly understand until you have been through the process. Third, this program is designed for you to succeed. Don't sign up if you plan to lean against the tree at Ed's apiary and just watch. You will be asked to do the actual work, lifting supers, finding queens, locating right aged brood, judging colony strength, evaluating colonies for their traits and lots more. Finally, I want every participant to produce quality queens by the end of the course. It is time to do it, and stop talking about doing it! If we are going to have better queens available in the Great Lakes area, we must all work to develop the skills needed to do this. Maybe this course will generate a half-dozen new queen producers in Michigan. That would be fantastic. Even if each participant became a much more qualified beekeeper I will be delighted. There are few times when you get to pick my brain as much as this class offers. I hope that is a good thing -- I admit it scares me a little!

EDITORIAL COMMENT

At one time, Michigan led the nation in queen production, but in recent years, we have become increasingly dependent upon queens raised in the southeastern states. (Beekeepers using these bees are reporting poor queens and supercedure.) Presently, there are only 5 major queen breeders, and with the loss of feral hives, the lack of genetic diversity has become a major biological concern.

With increased spring re-queening, beekeepers are forced to depend upon southern states for queens. By raising our own queens and re-queening in summer and fall, we can reduce this dependency.

Please consider taking the Queen Rearing Course and start raising your own queens. It could be an additional source of income and you

would be providing a great service to Michigan beekeepers.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

As the new SEMBA president, one of my goals is to re-energize the committee structure of the organization and to involve more of the members. SEMBA has a number of great programs and activities in which we take pride, but we need the help of additional individuals.

GREAT RECIPE FOR BARBECUED SANDWICHES

SEMBA member, Donna Holly, well known for her ribbon-winning pickle and canning entries in the Michigan State Fair, provided us with her recipe for barbecued sandwiches which took first place in the 2007 Michigan State Fair:

½ cup ketchup
 ½ cup water
 1 clove of garlic
 1 teaspoon of chili powder
 ½ teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce
 ¼ cup honey
 1 teaspoon mustard
 Slices of cooked meat of your choice: beef, chicken, or pork.

Mix first 7 ingredients together and cook slowly for 10 minutes. Add the meat slices and heat thoroughly. Place meat and barbecue sauce on slices of bread or buns.

This recipe is good for BBQ Chicken or Pork. Also, good as a marinate or dipping sauce. Spice this recipe up. Changes are good. Add chipotle peppers in adobo sauce, or dried or powdered. Excellent.

BEE VIRUS NOT FROM AUSTRALIA

US scientists have just found that a bee virus, which they had thought was recently arrived from Australia, has actually been in the country for about five years.

The Agricultural Research Service scientists have found that the Israeli acute paralysis virus (IAPV), a virus recently shown to be associated with Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD) of honey bees, has been in the United States since at least 2002.

Research entomologists Yanping (Judy) Chen and Jay D. Evans, both with the ARS Bee Research Laboratory here, conducted a detailed

genetic screening of several hundred honey bees that had been collected between 2002 and 2007 from colonies in Maryland, Pennsylvania, California and Israel. "Our study shows that, without question, IAPV has been in this country since at least 2002," said Chen. "This work challenges the idea that IAPV is a recent introduction from Australia."

Evans added, "Our study in no way rules IAPV out as a factor in CCD. We have always believed that CCD is a complex issue likely involving multiple elements. Research by several groups will now focus on understanding differences in virulence across strains of IAPV and on interactions with other stress factors."
